2013 was a year of challenges and changes, some within our control, and some not in our control. However, Northcon continued to grow and develop even in the face of Government shutdowns and a slowdown in Government spending nationwide. Northcon continued our strong record of quality project delivery at our program sites across the country with a continued high level of client satisfaction.

We have also developed a new relationship with an Alaskan Native Corporation, Kautaq, a subsidiary of UIC. They are an SBA certified Small Business, HUBZone, 8(a) Company. This new partnership resulted in the award of a major SABER contract for the Air Force at Cannon Air Force Base in New Mexico and the development of several pending proposals in the Southwest. Northcon looks forward to this new partnership and developing multiple new areas of business throughout the country with KAUTAQ and our various other partnerships. Additionally, Northcon was awarded a major program with the state of Nevada's National Guard; we are still waiting on the development and maturation of this program.

Also in 2013, we unfortunately have

seen the successful completion of several key programs. We have closed our operation in Boise, ID after 5 years. Northcon successfully exceeded our original contractual obligation with the JOC at Gowen Field and the Army has opted not to re-compete this vital contract at this time. Northcon also opted to close our operations at Killeen, TX and Fort Leonard Wood, MO. All of these sites have been key to Northcon, but the slowdown in Government spending limited our opportunities. Northcon will continue to monitor and track future strategic opportunities with these customers and areas. Thanks to all who have been involved with these programs.

With the completion of 2013, Northcon achieved another planned significant growth milestone as we have now grown out of the small business designation for the Federal Government. While this may have some short term business development limitations, we strongly believe we have established the necessary business partnerships to allow us to continue to be competitive in the small and large business, full and open arena. With our growth in size and more importantly in geography, we are strategically positioned to approach a very diverse type and number of opportunities by now being considered as a "local"



contractor. This success has been effectively demonstrated by recent stand-alone project wins from coast -to-coast. From east coast at Glynco, GA, to west coast at Joint-Base Lewis McChord.

Northcon's strength comes from our employees and their commitment to success and the highest levels of client satisfaction. As noted in this newsletter, our growth has created new opportunities for our employees to grow within the company and help create growth potential at our new locales. We look forward to continuing this trend as we continue working as a team and grow together.

FLETC GLYNCO Building 680

Title: Renovate Building 680 **Award Amount:** \$9.4M

In-progress and scheduled to be completed 02/2014

Project Description:

This project consists of the renovation of an existing 80,352 square feet office /

warehouse into a multi-function facility. Renovation has included removal of all existing interior walls, roof, plumbing, HVAC systems, ductwork, electrical and telecommunications. Exterior windows and doors removed and replaced with energy efficient new construction product. The project also includes a complete upgrade of the fire alarm system as well as removing the building from the established campus steam distribution loop. All ceilings have been removed and replaced, new HVAC systems installed and new lighting has been provided throughout the building, as well as all associated utilities and incidental related work. This project is being developed for a silver LEED rating.



FLETC GLYNCO Building 64

Title: Renovate Building 64 **Award Amount:** \$5.8M

Project has just started and is scheduled to be completed 11/2014

Project Description: This project involves the renovation of Building 64. Building 64 is a three story building and contains 22,000 square feet. The facility will be deconstructed down to its concrete structure that consist of concrete columns, floors, roof deck, and stair enclosures. All existing architectural, plumbing, mechanical, and electrical systems shall be removed as indicated on the construction drawings. The new facility will be designed to LEED Silver Certification.

The Federal Law Enforcement Training Center (FLETC) serves as an interagency law enforcement training organization for 91 Federal agencies. The FLETC is headquartered at Glynco, GA. The Center's parent agency, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), supervises its administrative and financial activities.

Also, as an interagency training organization, the FLETC has assembled the finest professionals from diverse backgrounds to serve on its faculty and staff. Approximately 50 percent of the instructor staff are permanent FLETC employees. The remainder are Federal officers and investigators on short-term assignment from their parent organizations or recently retired from the field. This mix of permanent, detailed, and recently retired staff provides a balance of experience and fresh insight from the field.

Slow Cooker Spicy Chicken Nachos

Prep Time: 15 minutes Total Time: 3 Hours

Serves: 24

INGREDIENTS:

- Loaf (16 oz) Mexican prepared cheese product with jalapeno peppers, cut into cubes
- 3/4 Cup of Thick 'n Chunky salsa
- Can (15 oz) black beans, drained, & rinsed
- Package (9 oz) frozen cooked chicken breast strips, thawed, & cubed
- Container (8 oz) sour cream
- Medium red bell pepper, chopped (1 cup)
- Medium green onions, sliced (3 tablespoons)
- Large bag of tortilla chips

DIRECTIONS:

- Spray 3 to 4-quart slow cooker with cooking spray. In cooker place cheese, salsa, beans, & chicken.
- Cover; cook on Low heat setting 2 hours, stirring once halfway through cookina.
- Stir in sour cream, bell peppers and onions. Increase heat setting to High. Cover; cook about 45 minutes longer or until mixture is hot.
- Serve with tortilla chips. Topping can be kept warm on Low heating setting up to 2 hours; stir occasionally.

Malware, Viruses, Spyware, Spam - What are they and how do we protect ourselves?

MALWARE is short for malicious software and designed to cause damage to a stand-alone or networked computer. Malware consists of many types of programs such as worms, viruses, trojans, spyware, etc.

VIRUS is a program written to enter your computer and damage/alter your files or data. It might corrupt or delete data on your computer making your computer inoperable and may also replicate itself. Often viruses are disguised as games, images, email attachments, website URLs, shared files or links or files in instant messages.

SPYWARE is a program used to collect information about users, their computer or their browsing habits. It can track everything without your knowledge and send to a remote user. It can be installed with or without your permission and can also download other malicious programs from the internet and install it to the computer. Spyware can interfere with your computer's system settings, which can result in a slower internet connection.

SPAM is a method of flooding the internet with copies of the same message. Most spam is commercial advertisements which are sent as an unwanted email. It is also known as electronic junk mail.

Here are a few practices that will help protect you and your computer from these type of attacks:

- Don't download files from unknown sources, including from your email or the web.
- Don't download any program from websites you don't trust.
- Don't download attachments (pictures, games, electronic greetings) unless it's from someone you know and you are expecting it.
- Install an Antivirus and keep it updated to protect against Viruses (sometimes it will include a spyware option)
- Start running a spyware and /or malware software on a regular basis. If spyware or malware is found, have program remove it then reboot and run it again. Some times the spyware or malware may be tough to remove and will take a few times to remove it.
- Be careful when downloading free or peer-to-peer files, especially music files & media sharing programs. Many popular applications include spyware components.
- Protect your computer with a firewall, especially if you use a broadband internet connection.
- Adjust your browser's security settings to provide at least medium level of security. Lowering the setting allows for easier access by malware. Using or keeping the default settings would be best.

No matter what industry you work in, applying safety tips CAN prevent accidents :o)

→ Falls are the leading cause of injury in the work place. Keep these tips in mind to avoid an injury:



- As you walk, keep an eye on the floor in front of you for spills
- If you see a spill, NEVER just walk by it. ALWAYS clean it up or call someone to clean it up.
- →Learn where fire extinguishers & first aid kits are located
 - Know where these items are BEFORE the need arises to find & get them.
 - Know how the fire extinguisher functions before using it.
- →Never take risks when it comes to your safety
 - Safety should be your first thought, not an afterthought.
 - Report any observed unsafe condition to your supervisor.
- →Be alert to hazards that could affect you & your fellow employees
 - Pay attention to your work surroundings.
 - Maintain a general condition of good housekeeping in all work areas at all times.
